Isaac Van Deusen, son of Cornelius, settled in Vineland
in 1901

In tracing back the ancestry of these brothers we have depended partly upon the "Van Deusen Family" by Capt. Albert H. Van Deusen for the connection between the immigrant ancestor Abraham and Johannes (5) Van Deusen; for the latter's data, the copy of his old family Bible record and the John J. Van Deusen descendants we are indebted to Mrs. I. N. Powell of Chicago, Ill. For the record of the Cornelius Van Deusen branches, we wish to express our thanks to Mrs. Powell, Mrs. F. R. Fortune and all those who in large or small measure helped in its completion, but especially to Mrs. Peter Duryea of Stockbridge, Mass., for a generous interest and unstinted efforts and to Miss Kate Van Dusen, Mrs. Lillie B. Van Zile and Frank Van Deusen, whose memories seldom were at fault and whose patience and willingness never failed.

1. Abraham Pieterson (Van Deursen), the immigrant, was born, in the city of Haarlem, Holland, where he was baptized Nov. 11, 1607, in the Dutch Reformed Church. Intention of marriage recorded, Haarlem, Nov. 25, 1629; married, Haarlem, Dec. 9, 1629, Tryntje Melchoirs, born in Groningen. Came to America before 1636 settling in New Amsterdam, where he ran an inn and a mill. Date of death unknown.

He married (1) Sept. 22, 1689, Cornelia Martense Van Buren, dau. of Martin Cornelissen and Araantje Gerretse (Van den Bergh) Van Buren, married (2), Aug. 21, 1718, Geertruy Van Benthuysen. *dau. of Paulus Martense van Benthuysen and G. St. van den Bergh*
He lived in Albany, Kinderhook and, in 1720, was a free-holder in Claverack, N. Y.

5. Johannes Van Deusen, (Tobias 4, Robbert 3, Matthew 2, Abraham 1.) baptised at Claverack, N. Y., May 30, 1728; died at Coxsackie, to which town he moved after the Revolutionary War, Oct. 14, 1803. Married (1), Claverack, N. Y., May 29, 1750, Christina De La Matre, daughter of Gloude De La Matre and Christina Leggett; she died or was buried Oct. 14, 1767 and he married (2), Feb. 3, 1770, Maritie Bronck, born Feb. 20, 1740. He served in the Eighth Regt., Albany County Militia under Col. Robt. Van Renssalaer and was by the testimony to his son Gloude, Chairman of the Committee of Safety for the town of Claverack during the entire period of the war. The large brick house in which he resided was used as a fort as long as hostilities continued.

His will, dated July 21, 1846 and recorded March 22, 1847, mentions his sons Cornelius and John, his daughter Betsy, wife of Isaac Van Slyck and his wife Hannah, who later removed from her husband's farm near Valatie, N. Y., to Albany, N. Y.

7. Cornelius Van Deusen (Jacobus 6, Johannes 5, Tobias 4, Robbert 3, Matthew 2, Abraham 1.) was born about 1788 in Kinderhook, N. Y.; died at Philadelphia, Pa., Aug. 17, 1873 in his eighty-sixth year, and was buried in South Laurel Hill Cemetery. He married, Kinderhook, N. Y., March 24, 1811, Maria McCagg born Kinderhook, 1792 and died, LeRoy, N. Y., Sept. 1867; sister of Isaac McCagg of Chicago, Ill., and Matthew McCagg of Warsaw, N. Y.; dau. of — and Rosanna (—) McCagg.

He served in the War of 1812 as orderly sergeant in Capt Henry Van Vleck's Co., Col. Jacob R. Van Rensselaer's 47th Regt. of New York Militia, his period of active service being from Sept. 8, 1812 to Dec. 10, 1812; for this he was given a land grant of eight acres, which was later turned over for sale, to his son Frank. He moved to White Pigeon, Mich., 1836; LeRoy, N. Y., 1840; after the death of his wife, to Troy, N. Y., where he and his daughter Mrs. Fitch made their home until, in 1871, he went to Philadelphia, and she to care for the children of John Van Deusen in Chicago, Ill.

Both he and his wife were admitted to the Kinderhook Church, July, 1821.

8. John J. Van Deusen, (Jacobus 6, Johannes 5, Tobias 4, Robbert 3, Matthew 2, Abraham 1.) was born in Kinderhook, N. Y., Dec. 24, 1801 and died Jan. 12, 1880 at Lexington, Ind. He married, Oct. 12, 1837, Maria Vosburgh, daughter of _____ Vosburgh and _____ McLean, born June 10, 1812, Kinderhook, (?); d. Feb. 4, 1860 at Lexington, Ind., where both she and her husband are buried.

He was a farmer at Kinderhook; from there he moved to LeRoy, Troy and Batavia, N. Y., finally seeking the west hoping to find a more suitable climate for his wife who had been an invalid for some years. He eventually located upon a farm at Lexington, Ind., the then county-seat of Scott Co., where he spent the remainder of his life. After his death the farm became part of the William English estate, and can be partially traced by its fine old beech trees.

9. James Van Dusen, (Cornelius 7, Jacobus 6, Johannes 5, Tobias 4, Robbert 3, Matthew 2, Abraham 1.) was born Kinderhook or Columbia, N. Y., May 9, 1812; died Richmond, Ind., April 29, 1910 and was buried in Earlham Cemetery. Married, Cincinnati, O., on May 8, 1845, Sophia Smith, daughter of Benjamin and Nancy (Horton) Smith, born Cincinnati, Dec. 29, 1819; died, Richmond, Ind., Dec. 1, 1900 and was buried in Earlham Cemetery.

When in 1836 his father's family left the Kinderhook farm for White Pigeon, Mich., he moved to Cincinnati, where he was employed by an Ohio river steamboat company, following this business for nine years with different companies along the Ohio and Mississippi. In 1845 he became ticket agent for the "Little Miami" railroad at Cincinnati, was promoted to the office of general ticket and freight agent for the company, and in 1862 was sent to Richmond, Ind., as manager of their line known as the "Dayton & Western." At the end of five years he returned to Cincinnati where he was with the company until honorably retired in 1880.

At nearly 98 years of age his hearing was but little impaired and his eyesight as keen as that of one many years his junior. He was known as Richmond's "Grand Old Man."

She married, at Lima, N. Y., Sept. 20, 1834, Ami Harrison Carpenter, born Bridgewater, Conn., Feb. 15, 1813, died, Warsaw, N. Y., Feb. 27, 1907, son of Jesse and Dolla (Herick) Carpenter. They moved to Kalamazoo, Mich., in 1839 and to Warsaw, N. Y., in 1840. She united with the Presbyterian Church in Warsaw, but in 1860 was confirmed in Trinity Episcopal Church.

11. Matthew Van Deusen, (Cornelius 7, Jacobus 6, Johannes 5, Tobias 4, Robbert 3, Matthew 2, Abraham 1.) was born Dec. 3, 1822, at Kinderhook, Columbia Co., N. Y.; died Feb. 20, 1917, at Manchester, Iowa, being buried in Oakland Cemetery. Married at White Pigeon, Mich., April 1, 1848, Sarah Barnes, born July 27, 1828 at Steuben, Oneida Co., N. Y., died Manchester, Aug. 27, 1897 and buried in Oakland Cemetery, daughter of Ethelbert and Zilpha (Tripp) Barnes.

He was a man of varied occupations, being at one time in the creamery business in Manchester where he made the first creamery butter produced in the United States.

12. John Van Deusen, (Cornelius 7, Jacobus 6, Johannes 5, Tobias 4, Robbert 3, Matthew 2, Abraham 1.) was born at Kinderhook, N. Y., Dec. 13, 1825; died, Tappen, N. D., April 15, 1891; buried Woodland Cemetery, Philadelphia, Pa. He married (1), at Richmond, Ind., Dec. 24, 1856, Indiana Stanton, daughter of Stephen Butler and Eliza (Fisher) Stanton, born Richmond, Ind., April 13, 1838; died Richmond, June 21, 1858. She was buried at Maple Grove and was later moved to Earlham Cemetery, Richmond, Ind. He married (2), at Philadelphia, Pa., Nov. 30, 1864, Francina Louisa Griffith, age 21, a woman of great beauty who died March 2, 1871; buried in Woodland Cemetery, Philadelphia, Pa.

He resided at Newport, Ky., Richmond, Ind., Philadelphia, Pa., Chicago, Ill., Milwaukee, Wis., and Tappen, N. D., and was by turns a merchant, railroad agent and farmer.

13. Isaac Van Deusen, M. D., (Cornelius 7, Jacobus 6, Johannes 5, Tobias 4, Robbert 3, Matthew 2, Abraham 1.) was born in the old home at Valatie, Columbia Co., N. Y., Nov. 7, 1829; died, Philadelphia, Pa., Aug. 9, 1918. He settled in Troy, N. Y., in 1853, where he remained until, in 1860, he removed to Philadelphia. In 1901 he located in Vineland on the S. W. corner of Main and Forest Grove Road, but a year or two later bought a property on Park Avenue just east of the Paul Van Deusen place, eventually returning to Philadelphia about 1912.

He was a merchant until 1884 when he graduated from a Chicago medical college. He subsequently was directly or indirectly connected with the practice of medicine although he never established a private practice, being physician for a mining company in Duluth, Minn.; physician for one of the Philadelphia boards of charity and associated with Mead, Johnson & Co., Jersey City, N. J.

He became a Mason when twenty-one years old and continued his active interest until his death. He was a Past Master, a Past High Priest and the historian of his lodge.

He married in Troy, N. Y., —— 1858, Josephine Hicks, born New York City, June, 1835; died Philadelphia, Pa., Dec. 24, 1921. In 1873 she graduated from the Woman's Medical College of Philadelphia, in which city she practiced successfully for many years. She was the daughter of Catherine (Van Norden) and Charles Hicks who was the inventor of the first percussion caps, the machine for making them and the powder with which they were charged; also, at the time of his death had practically perfected the Hick's Centrifugal Dynamite Gun.

He graduated in chemistry at the University of Pennsylvania and was chemist for the Atlantic Refining Co., for a number of years until at the age of twenty-three, in company with his brother Isaac, he went prospecting in Wyoming where he was blinded by dynamite two or three years later; returning East he married at Woodbury, N. J., March 26, 1901, Lavinia Pearce, born at Bolton, Lancashire, England, Feb. 2, 1864, daughter of James and Elizabeth (Smith) Pearce.

NOTE

For those who are interested in the history of the Van Deusen family in Holland, and have not the advantage of Captain Albert Harrison Van Deusen's "Van Deusen Family" we have taken from it the following information:—

In 1196 during the time of the third crusade, mention is made of a Hendricus a van Doersen. It is very possible he was a crusader and the cross in the coat of arms was taken up by him.

In 1325 Govert Van Doersen acknowledged Jan III of Brabant as his liege-lord and received back his ancestral property as a hereditary feudal, it remaining in the straight male line until the end of the 16th century.

In 1419 Jan Van Deursen, possibly grandson or great grandson of Govert, married Aleid van Bloemensweerde and from his time there is no break in the family line.

Jan, married Elisabeth Van Heusden, and was alive in 1550 being the last male in descent from Govert to hold the lands and castles of Duersen.


