

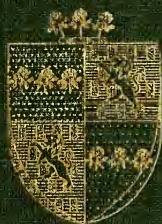

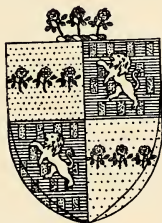

PREFACE

THE sources of this compilation are chiefly the Doop and Trouw Boeken of the Reformed (Dutch) Churches at Albany, New York, Claverack, Kinderhook, Churchtown, Livingston and Kingston. These registers of baptisms and marriages have been very carefully examined, and are complete from 1685 to 1760, Albany; from the beginning to 1787, Claverack; — to 1820, Churchtown; — to 1780, Johnstown; — to 1784, Kinderhook; and from 1660 to 1809, Kingston. In addition to the above sources of information, much valuable data have been obtained from the records of deeds, wills, mortgages, marriage and other contracts, powers of attorney, proceedings of magistrates, etc., found in the offices of the clerks of the cities and counties of Albany and New York; the early records and papers in the office of the Secretary of State, the Clerk of the Court of Appeals, Surrogates of the counties of Columbia, New York, Albany and Dutchess; Munsell's Annals and Collections of Albany; the works of Dr. O'Callaghan; the New York Historical collections; family records and papers; local histories, and gravestone inscriptions.

I wish, also, to acknowledge the great assistance rendered by Mr. Robert T. Van Deusen, of Stuyvesant, who has furnished the nucleus of this genealogy from notes gathered by him a few years ago.

The name Van Deusen is found in the early records spelled as Van Deusen, Vandeusen, Van duzen, Van deuse, Van Deussen, Van Dorsen, Van Dozer, Van Duee, Van Duesen, Van Dueser, Van Dueson, Vandueus, Van Dusan,

Vanduse, Van Duusen, Van Deuzer, Van Duzer, Van Deursen, Van Deurse.

Owing to the fact that surnames were little used in the early days of the Dutch colonies, and the Christian names were so badly misspelled that they were scarcely recognizable, it has been difficult to trace the genealogical lines. This difficulty has been enhanced by the propensity manifested in families to use the same Christian names. Thus, "Isaac Rich," becomes in a few years Isaac I., to distinguish him from his son, Isaac II., and his grandchildren, Isaac III., IV., V., and VI. William, the son of Jacob, becomes William Jacobse to distinguish him from some other William, instead of using the surname.

Three classes of numbers are used, viz. :

I CONSECUTIVE. These figures begin with No. 1, and are found in and constitute the left-hand column of the book.

II FAMILY. These are taken from the consecutive numbers and placed over the head of the family of the person they stand for in the consecutive column.

III REFERENCE. These are also taken from the consecutive column and placed in parenthesis before certain names in order to show relationship and intermarriages.

VAN DEUSEN GENEALOGY

The name, Van Deusen, probably derived its origin from a small hamlet of about five hundred inhabitants in Noord Braband, in the Netherlands, called Deursen.

1 ABRAHAM VAN DEUSEN had five sons who came to America about the middle of the seventeenth century. The names of these five sons were: Isaac, Melchert, Mattheus, Jacob and Peter.

The small Burgher Right required that "all those who kept any shop, however it may be called, and carry on business within this city (Amsterdam in New Netherland) or the jurisdiction thereof, shall be bound to apply to the Burgomasters for the small Burgher Right, and pay therefor Twenty Guilders, Dutch money, or the equivalent thereof."

(11) Isaac Isaacksen Van Deurse was registered as Cordwainer, July 5, 1698.

Melchert resided in the town of Schotack (Schodack). He was buried in Papsknee (opposite Albany), Jan. 6, 1742. Engeltje, wife of Melchert Abrahamse, was buried July 11, 1728. He was a freeholder in the colony of Rensselaerwyck in 1720.

The following is a copy of a mortgage pledging certain personal property (part of which was in the possession of Melchert Abrahamse Van Deusen) given as security for a certain sum owing on a bail bond.

“Appeared before me, Ludovicus Cobes, Secretary of Albany, New Amsterdam, &c, in presence of the Hon. Heeren commissaries, &c, Philip Pieterse Schyler and Jan Hendrickse Van Bael, Eldert Gerbertse Cruiff, who acknowledged that he is well and honestly indebted to and in

arrears to Messieurs Jan Hendrick Bruyns and Hans Hendrickse, in the net sum of three hundred and fifty francs in beavers and forty-eight francs in seewant, together with seventy-five boards, growing out of a matter of security, as principals bound for said Cruiff, in consequence of a certain sentence dated the 5th of January, 1670, which aforesaid money the subscriber promises to pay to said Jan Hendrick Bruyns and Hans Hendrickse punctually in the time of six weeks without any longer delay, therefore pledging especially his distilling kettle, worm and dome, the saw-mill at Bethlehem and all his lands in Catskil, together with all his title to his house, brewery in a lot lying here in Albany, likewise two cows here and four cattle, with Gerrit Theunisse (Van Vechten) two cattle with (3) Melgert Abrahamse (Van Deusen) at Schotaack, three head of cattle with Jan Helmerse (alias de Boek), half of which is coming to him and three heifers with Hendrick Maerson and a bull: furthermore generally his person and estate, personal and real, present and future, nothing excepted, putting the same in subjection to all the lord's laws and judges for the recovery of said payment in due time if need be without loss or cost.

Cornelis Van Vechten, Defend^t,

The Plentives Declaration Read & is as followeth viz:

Mayors Court 4th year of her Majes. Reign (3) Melgt

Abrahamse, of y^e Colony of Rensselaerwyck in y^e County aforesaid, yoeman Complains agst Cornelis Teunise Van Vechten of Bethlehem of y^e Colony aforesaid in y^e County aforesaid yeoman of a plea upon y^e Case & whereupon y^e said Melgt by John Collins his attorney saith that whereas y^e s^d Cornelis anno domini 1685 at y^e Dwelling house of y^e said Melgt in y^e County aforesaid was indebted unto y^e said Melgert one hundred and Eighty skipple of good merchandable wheat at six skipple for a Beaver (otherwise cald Twelve shillings) by y^e said Melgert to y^e Especial Instance and Request of him y^e said Cornelis their and at that time soold and Delivered and the said Cornelis being so indebted in consideration thereof did assume upon himselfe and to y^e said Melgert did faithfully promise that he the said Cornelis in Consideration thereof would well and truly pay to Dirk Teunise van Vechten of y^e said County now dec^d, thirty Beavers (otherwise called Eighteen pounds) upon y^e account of him the said Melgert yet the said Cornelis, his promise not Regarding but subtilly Intending him y^e said Melgert in that Behalfe to Deceave, the said thirty Beavers to y^e said Dirk Teunise on the account of him y^e said Melgert hath not as yet payd and for y^e said wheat him y^e s^d Melgert to satisfy hath refuzed & still doth Refuze to Damage of him y^e said Melkert fifteen pounds & thereupon he Brings this suite.

The Defend^{ts} Plea read vizt:

Cornelis Teunise van Vechten of Bethelhem in y^e Colony of Rensselaerwyck in y^e County of Albany yoeman by Richard Brewer his attorney makes answer to y^e declaration of Melkt Abrahamse of y^e Colony & County afores^d that whereas in y^e s^d Declaration of said Melkert Abrahamse by his attorney John Collins Complains that y^e aforesaid Cornelis Teunise van Vechten is indebted to y^e said Melkrt Abrahamse for one hundred and eighty skippels of the winter wheat delivered by the aforesaid Melkert Abrahamse to y^e said Cornelis Teunise van Vechten in y^e year of our Lord 1689 at y^e price as it is sett forth in y^e

declaration aforesaid Cornelis Teunise Van Vechten doth utterly deneigh the Receipt or delivery of any part or parcel of the aforesaid wheat, either by or to him the s^d Cornelis Teunise or his order and further saith not but puteth himself on his Countrey.

Albany March y^e 26th 1705.

The Plentive by John Collins his attorney doth demur to y^e Defendants Plea and saith that it is not good in Law it neither being in Barr of y^e action brought or in abatement of the Writt, neither admits y^e action to be tryed by his Countrey, and therefor not Issuable and no tryal by Law to be had without Issue joynd, wherefor the Plentive prays a nonsuite against the defend^t for such his Irregular proceedings and denies y^e Judgement of this Court therein.

JOHN COLLINS.

The Defend^t by his attorney Rich. Brewer, prays that the action may proceed, being willing to pay the Costs thus farr, The Court, taking Consideration in y^e matter are of opinion that y^e action doe proceed, and that y^e deft doe pay y^e Costs of sute so farr and that therefore the Deft has leave to amend his plea ordered that y^e Jury bee cald up vizt: William Claese Groesbeck, Elbert Gerritse, Gysbert Marselis Gerrit Ryckse, Gerrit Lansing, Junr, Phillip forrest, harmanus wendell, gerrit Luykasse Wyngaert, Mynd^t Roseboom, hendk vroman, Isaac Lansing, Jacobus Schuyler, The jury was sworn, and after the examination of witnesses, found a verdict for the Defendant, The Court then adjourned "till y^e day, 24 night."

Teuwis (Matthew) Van Deusen resided in the village of Beverwyck (Albany) in 1659 (Pearson). He was there from 1657 to 1700 (Talcott). He owned a lot on Broadway, about thirty-five feet in front, extending back to James Street, from 1656 to 1667.

On the 13th of December, 1677, Paulus Martense Van Benthuisen conveyed by deed to Harme Janse Lyndrayer the same property in Rensselaerwyck heretofore conveyed to him by (4) Mattheus Abrahamse Van Deusen, by deed dated June 26, 1677, of which the following is a copy:

“Appeared before me Ro. Livingston, secr &c and in the presence of the Honorable Messieurs Richard Pretty & Andries Teller, commissaries, etc., Paulus Martense Raenmaker (wagon maker) (Van Benthuisen), who declared that he had in true rights, free ownership, granted conveyed and transferred to and for the behoof of Harme Janse Lyndrayer (ropemaker) in a certain house and lot standing and lying here in Albany, with all that is therein fast by earth and nailed, and is bounded south by Pieter Loockermans, north by the house of Laurens Van Ale & Jan Janse Bleecker, west and east by the public street, in breadth in front on the street (Broadway), two rods, and in the rear on the west side (James Street) one rod and ten feet and a half, length on the north side six and one-half rods, and

on the south side six rods five feet and a half, which this grantor, does by virtue of the conveyance given him by (4) Mattheus Abrahamse (Van Deusen) of date the 26 of June 1677, to which reference is here made, and with free and unencumbered and with no claims standing or issuing against the same (except the lords' right) and without the grantor making the least pretension any more to it, acknowledging that he is fully paid and satisfied, the first penny with the last, and therefore giving plenam actionem cessam, and perfect power to the aforesaid Harme Janse Lyndrayer, his heirs and successors, or those who may hereafter acquire his right and title, to do with and dispose of the aforesaid house and lot as he might do with his patrimonial estate and effects, promising the same to defend against all persons, and to free it from all trouble, claims or charges, which may hereafter arise, and never more to do nor suffer anything to be done against the same, either with or without law in any manner whatsoever, under obligation as provided therefore according to law.

The said property was situated in the City of Albany, on the west side of and fronting on Broadway, north of Maiden Lane, extending back to same street and lying between Maiden Lane and Steuben Street.

The following are the conditions of sale of chattels to be held in Rensselaerwyck on the day and year therein stated on which the administrator of the estate of Philip Hendrickse (Brouwer) “proposes to sell some horses and cattle, together with a horse-mill, as it stands, to be paid

for on the 15th of July, in this year, 1664, in good merchantable beaver skins; the auction fees to become a charge to the buyer and payable as above." At which sale (4) Mattheus Abrahamse (Van Deusen) bought a cow for one hundred and eighteen florins, for the payment of which Cornelis Teunisse Bos went his "surety and principal"; and Mattheus Abrahamse (Van Deusen) on his part pledged himself as surety for Cornelis Bos on the same day, for the payment of one hundred and twelve guilders for the purchase of the running works of a horse-mill.

Samson Benson removed from Albany to New York City about 1696. "He is supposed to have lived on 'Pottbakers Hill' (now John Street, between William and Gold Streets)." (Talcott.) Several of his children are named in his will, dated July 20, 1726.

"The late Judge Egbert Benson, of Revolutionary fame, and the late Egbert Benson, of New York and New Utrecht, are among his descendants." (Bergen.)

Dirck Benson, the father of Samson, who married (24) Tryntje Van Deusen, was in Claverack as early as 1676. On April 19, 1675, Gerrit Slichtenhoost agreed to sell a piece of land to Dirck and his brother Johannes. In the following year, on June 20, Dirck Benson contracted with Claes Jansen Van Baeren (Beuren) to build a house at Claverack 20 feet square. Captain Johannes Benson, the son of Dirck, who married, Feb. 2, 1680, (22) Lysbet, daughter of (4) Mattheus Abrahamse Van Deusen and Helena, probably resided there at that time. In 1689 he was a resident of Claverack, and was appointed in March of that year Captain of a Company of Militia, when an attack was expected from the French and Indians. In the following year he removed to Harlem.

Munsell says that Abraham, who married Jacomyntje Van Schoonhoven, was a son of Jacob; Sahler places Abraham among the children of Matthew.

Catalyntje, wife of (5) Jacob Van Deusen, was a daughter of Claas Van Eslant, an undertaker in New Amsterdam. In 1677, being about to return to Holland, Catalyntje got a certificate from the "Commissarissen" at Albany, that she was the daughter of Claas Van Eslant, deceased, undertaker in New Amsterdam, and that her object in returning to Holland was to collect certain legacies due her there. Her husband and her brother, Claas, also gave her powers of attorney to collect the legacies left them by their uncle Harmanus Antonides Vander Linde, minister in his lifetime at Naerden.

"Appeared before me Johannes Provoost, secretary of Albany, and in the presence of Jan Verbeeck and Jacob Schermerhooven, magistrates of the jurisdiction of Albany

aforesaid: Jochim Kettleheyn, citizen of said place, who declared that he had granted and conveyed, as by these presents he does grant and convey, in real and actual possession, to and for the behoof of (5) Jacob Abrahamse, cooper [kuyper, Van Deusen], his heirs or assigns a lot, lying in Albany, bounded on the west by the street, on the east by the grantor's lot, on the north by the grantor's house, and on the south by the house of Arnout Cornelise [Viele]; in length three rods nine feet and seven inches, breadth one rod eight feet and an inch, which lot is a part of a patent given to the grantor by the director general and council of New Netherland, of date 25 Oct., A.D. 1653; wherefore he promises to free the same from all actions, claims and demands, which hereafter may come against the same, binding his person and estate, personal and real, present and future, putting himself in subjection to all laws and judges.

“Done in Albany, 19th Feb., 1665, old style.

By the honorable, the commissaries of Albany, colony Renselaerswyck and Schaernhechtady, etc., whereas Catelyntje Van Eslant, wife of (5) Jacob Abrahamse (Van Deusen), Cuyper, (cooper) proposes to depart from here for Holland, to collect and receive there some monies, coming to her and her brother by way of inheritance, and bequest from her late mother's uncle, Harmanus Antonides Vander Linde, in his life time minister at Naerden, to which end she has solicited of us a certificate of testimonial, which we cannot refuse: therefore, we declare that she is a daughter of Claes Van Eslandt (sic), deceased, having been in his

life time undertaker (aenspreecker) and gravedigger at New York, and her mother's name Willenstie Harpers Vander Leinde.

Given under our hands and seals, in Albany, the 25th of September, and in the nine and twentieth year of the reign of our sovereign lord Charles the Second, by the Grace of God, King of Great Britain, France and Ireland, defender of the faith, 1677.

(This paper is a copy without signatures.)

Appeared before me Robert Livingstone, secr., etc., and in presence of the honorable magistrates, Mr. Philip Pieterse Schuyler and Mr. Richard Pretty, etc., Claes Van Eslandt, and (5) Jacob Abrahamse (Van Deusen), citizens of Albany, who declared that they had, in accordance with advices from Harmanus Vander Linde, dwelling in the Hage, in Holland, appointed and empowered Catelyntje Van Eslandt, wife of the aforesaid Jacob Abrahamse (Van Deusen), and sister of the aforesaid Claes Van Eslandt, specially to demand, collect and receive in Holland, etc., her and her aforesaid brother's portion of the inheritance and bequest, left for them by her mother's uncle, named Harmanus Antonides Vander Linde, in his life time minister at Naerden, and acquittance to execute for receipts, and for claims to caveeren (sic), and further, to do, perform and execute all things which may be needful and her judgment may suggest; promising at all times to hold good all that shall be done and performed in the aforesaid matter by their aforesaid sister and wife, as their attorney without any contradiction.

Done in Albany, in America, on the 25th of September, and in the nine and twentieth year of the reign of our sovereign lord, Charles the Second, by the grace of God, King of Great Britain, France, and Ireland, defender of the faith, Anno Domini, 1677.

(This paper is also a copy without signatures.)

From the minutes of Ref. (Dutch) Church at Albany, it appears that, in 1687, Albert Ryckman and (5) Jacob Abrahamse Van Deusen were in office. On the 17th Jan., 102 guilders were received from the poor taxes at Kinderhook. Annetje Barenzen was buried at an expense of 142 guilders. Domine Schaet's house was repaired out of the poor fund. In June was purchased of Peter Schuyler, major, a *waey*, for which was paid 2520 guilders, and in September another sum of 560 guilders was given to Dom. Dellius, on account of this waey, and in November, 48 g. more. The names of David Schuiler (sic), Gerrit Reyersen (whose daughter, Mary, married (51) Harpert, the son of (5) Jacob Abrahamse) and Egbert Tunissen (Van Vechten) appear for the first time among the Consistory.

In 1686, the deacons were Jan Lansingh and Jochim Staets. Their record begins a new book, which extends to 1715. For the first time we find the first two months of the year entered as of two years, thus 168 $\frac{5}{8}$, to correspond with the custom of the English.

Dr. Van Dyck was still physician to the poor at 150 guilders a year (\$18.75) in wampum. In August of this year they loaned the city authorities 4012:3 at 6 per cent. Six pounds of nails were purchased of Jan Tysen for the church at Kinderhook. A large amount was expended for building materials, in November, and mention is made of the domine's house and the deacons' or alms house. The elders of the church borrowed 248:18 of the deacons, 168 guilders were disbursed to Mary Jochimse on security. The annual certificate is signed by Gideon Schaats, Gr. Dell, Jacob Schermerhorren, Adriaen G. Papendorp, Dirck Wes-sels, (Ten Broeck) Albert Ryckman, and (5) Jacob Abrahamsen (Van Deusen).

At a Convention held in the Village of Rensslearwyck, Sept. 17, 1689, for the purpose of securing defense of the

County against the French, it was among other things, "Ordered y^t y^e assistants of y^e Respective wardes & y^e Military of y^e County goe about & see what y^e Inhabitants will be willing to advance for y^e Raiseing of some men for y^e Defence of this County against y^e french, and are sent with this following Proposall,

"PROPOSAL to y^e Commonality for y^e maintaining and paying of men in this juncture of time for our Defence against y^e french, since by the Present Revolutions we can expect no releef for or assistance from our neighbours according to their letters sent hither, which charge will be Represented by this Convention to y^e Gov'r whom there Magts. will be pleased to send; that s^d men may be p^d out of y^e Public Revenues of y^e Countrey being for y^e Preservation of these Magts. Interest in these parts, oy'wise that it will be paid by a general Tax out of y^e whole County, To y^e maintaining which men these following persons subscribe, viz: Of the second Ward, (5) Jacob Abrahamse (Van Deusen) £2; and of the farmers belonging to Captain Marten Gerritse Comp^l, (3) Melgert Abrahamse (Van Deusen) subscribed £: 8."

The following Articles of Indenture are recorded for Cornelius Clapper, the first day of November, Anno Dom. 1707, in the Citty of N. Yorke. Indenture of John Van Aarmen, with the consent of his mother, Sarah Van Aarmen, to Cornelius Clapper, Cordwainer, for six and a half years from Aug. 1st, 1707. Usual form. Apprentice "shall be allowed every three months evening schooling & four new shirts & four new neckcloths." Signed Aug. 26th, 1707 by Cornelius Clapper, John Van Aarmen. In the presence of (5) Jacob Van Duese, Jacobus Goelet.

On the 20th of June, 1678, (5) Jacob Abrahamse (Van Deusen) Cuyper, in the presence of Philip Schuyler and Richard Pretty, magistrates, acknowledged before Robert Livingston, Secr., that he had conveyed and transferred all

his right, title and interest to Jan Cornelise Vyselaer, alias Gow, in a certain lot standing and lying (here) in Albany; bounded on the South and West by Jochem Ketelheyn's; on the North by the house of the said Jan Gow; and on the East by the public street, containing in length, three rods, nine feet, and seven inches; and in breadth one rod, eight feet, and one inch, being the same premises hereto conveyed to him by patent under the hand and seal of the late governor-general, Richard Nicholls, of date the 22d of May, 1667, to which reference is here made for a more particular description.

Harpert Van Deusen was a freeholder in the Third Ward of the City of Albany in 1720; he resided previously and at the time of his marriage in Claverack. The first wife of Harpert Van Deusen, Lena (Helena), was buried on Thursday, June 28, 1728. At the time of her marriage she was a resident of the Colony of Rensselaerwyck.

Rutger Van Deusen was a freeholder in Rensselaerwyck in 1720. He was buried at Papsknee, June 22, 1731. Jan. 4, 1699, he took the oath of allegiance, and subscribed to the test and association. Rutger carried on the business of linen weaving.

At a meeting of the Council held in Albany, on the 7th of June, 1700, the following resolution was passed:

Whereas on the 24th of May last a warrant was directed to the assessors of this City to make their assessment for £100 upon the Inhabitants therein, and to make their return in the space of eight days to Mr. Mayor, under hand and seal, which assessment being made and produced at the meeting, "desyring approbation," but being found not to be sealed according to order "is given over again to y^e assessors and referred till (51) Harpert Jacobse (Van Deusen) Ben. van Corlaer, assessors, come home from New York, to the sealing thereof."

Albany, y^e 14th of October, A^o 1700. At the day appointed by the Charter of the City for the aldermen in their respective wards to make return of the aldermen, assistants, assessors and constables "for y^e ensueing year," (51) Harpert Jacobse (Van Deusen) was returned, as assistant from the "Third Warde."

At a Council meeting held on the 15th of November, 1700, at which were present: John Johnson Bleeker, Mayor; Joh. Schuyler, Da. Schuyler, Johannes Roseboom, John Cuyler, Wessel ten Broek, Joh. Abeel, aldermen; Jacob Turke, Hend. Oothout, Luykas Gerritse, Gerrit Van Ness, (51) Harpert Jacobse (Van Deusen) assistants.

It is concluded that the following Proclamation be proclaimed, That according to y^e yearly custome they doe hereby prohibit and forbid y^e Retailing of all sorts of strong Liquor within this City and County, unless by Mr. Mayors Lycense, on penalty of forfeiting as a fyne upon such person or persons so offending y^e summe of five pounds according to act of assembly, as also that no such Retailers shall receive from any Souldier upon any Pretence whatsoever any of their Provisions, Cloaths, or other accoutrements, or shall retaile to them in their house after y^e ringing of

y^e Bell for Eight o' clock at night upon penalty of forfeiting for each souldier so founde as aforesaid y^e summe of six shillings for y^e Behoffe of such Person as shall sue for y^e same.

At a meeting of the commonality held on the 24th of November, 1700, it was among other things concluded that warning be given to the Justices of the City and County to appear on the 23d of December at nine o'clock in the morning to fev (view) the City and County's accounts, for the late year to the 14th October last. To which end Johannis Abeel, John Schuyler, and Johannis Roseboom, aldermen, Jacobus Turke, Luykas Gerritse, and (51) Harpert Jacobse (Van Deusen), assistants, are appointed to "vizite" said accounts and see them justly made, returning them in the hands of Mr. Mayor the 21st of December next.

The Council, on the 27th of January, 1701, concluded and thought very necessary that fyre leathers and hooks be made for y^e behooffe of this Citty, since y^e old one Deckayed and lost. Wherefore it was resolved that three leathers of five and twenty, and three of eighteen foot be made, and three hooks of fifteen foot, which Hend. Oothout and (51) Harpert Jacobse (Van Deusen) have undertaken to make with all speed.

It is further concluded since the bridge by Col. Schuyler doth decay, that Mr. Roseboom, Hend. Oothout, and (51) Harpert Jacobse (Van Deusen) to "vizite y^e same and make returne" the next Court what is required to be repaired. On the following day, y^e Gent'n yesterday appointed to vizite y^e same doe Returne that it (the bridge) Requires to be Repaired with 1 oak Logg of 17 foot, &c. It is Resolved that the gutters next to the house of Mr. Cuyler near the fort, and the creek by the Lutheran Church, require before they can be repaired, one "pine logg of thirty foot long, and one to a half foot thick, at y^e small end, one of five and twenty foot, like thickness," &c., all which timber wood, as

aforementioned, Mr. Joh. Cuyler, alderman, (51) Harpert Jacobse (Van Deusen) and Hend. Oothout, assistants, have undertaken to agree with some "Particular Person who shall Ride y^e same upon y^e Citty charge."

On May 6, 1701, Mr. Joh. Lydius, Minister, Anthony van Schaik, Elder, and (51) Harpert Jacobse (Van Deusen) Dyaken of y^e Dutch Reformed Church of Albany, make application to the Commonality against Pr. Bogardus that he is about enfencing a certain lott of grounde Scituate, Lying and being in y^e great pasture to y^e southwarde of y^e Citty, Belonging to y^e Church wardens, and in possession to which they own a pretence. Desyreing y^e Gen'n in Common Council to be aiding and assisting to them in y^e premises that y^e further infencing may be stopt till y^e arrival of Maj. Dirk Wessels, who is supposed can give some Information relating said lott. Y^e Gen'n in Common Council have taken y^e Request in Consideration and sent for Mr. Bogardus desyreing him to forbear fencing four or five days till Maj. Wessells arrives, but fyndeing unwilling to allow s^d Days, are unanimously of opinion that s^d lott of grounde shall be no further Infenced till next Saturday, on the arrival of Dirk Wessels, who Emmediately shall be sent for.

On July 31, 1701, the Release or Conveyance of the Church at Albany (which, on the 1st instant was appointed to be drawn) is produced. The same after being perused is signed, sealed and delivered by John Johnson Bleeker, Esq., Mayor of this Citty, by and with advise and consent of the aldermen and Common Council, to Mr. Joh. Lydius, Minister of the Gospel of the Reformed Netherland Dutch Congregation of the City of Albany, Maj. Dirk Wessels, Anthony van Schack, Hend. v. Rensselaer, and Johannis Abeel, present Elders, and William Claese Groesbeck, (51) Harpert Jacobse (Van Deusen), Gerrit Van Ness, & Johannis Schuyler, present Dyakens of y^e s^d Congregation and their successors forever.

(51) Harpert Jacobse was again chosen assistant, from the Third Ward, and (15) Ruth Melgertse was chosen High Constable, for y^e Half Moon, Oct. 14, 1701.

On the 11th Instant the Council concluded that the following persons, viz.: Johannis Abeel, Johannis Roseboom, aldermen, Johannis Harmense, and (51) Harpert Jacobse (Van Deusen), assistants, be appointed to vew (view) y^e stockadoes lately bought by Tierk Harmense, &c.;— whether y^e same be sufficient and according to agreement, and to make returne of y^e same unto Mr. Mayor in y^e space of three times twenty four houres ensueing y^e date hereof.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonality met in Council on the 25th of November, 1701, and passed the following resolution: Whereas Complaints are made y^t diverse Inhabitants doe refuse to pay such summe or summes of money they are indebted to the 2 pr ct upon Indian goods, and 3d. upon each gallon Rom graunted by act of assembly to the City of Albany and County to defray their necessary [expenses], which goods and Rom being landed and received in their houses before the Determination of said act, which expired 1st July last. The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonality, after viewing of said act, take it into consideration that such Person or Persones must pay the money so indebted and thereto ordered the City Treasurer to goe rounde and collect the same, and in case such person or persones do refuse to pay such debts, if under 40s. to summonse them before any Justice, if above 40s. to sue for the same at the next Mayor's Court, moreover Jacob Turke and (51) Harpert Jacobse, assistants, are appointed to assist said Treasurer.

(15) Ruth Melgertse was chosen, assistant to the Council, from the Third Ward, where he then resided, Oct. 14, 1702.

At the meeting held on Dec. 8, 1702, the warrant in the usual form was passed.

Resolved that Johannis Schuyler, Hend. Hansen and Johannis Cuyler, aldermen, Luykas Gerritse, Johannis Beekman and (15) Ruth Melgertse (Van Deusen) assistance, doe inquire to the accounts of Citty and County, by Anthony Bratt, Treasurer, and that they bring their Report in Common Council on the Next Court Day.

Ann by the Grace of God of England, Scotland, France, and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, &c., to the Sheriffe of the Citty and County of Albany, greeting: Wee command you to summonse Twelf good and Lawful Men to Inquire to the Body of Jacob van Noorstrant Junr, now deceased, how he came to his End, and to bring there Verdict upon Oath under Hand and Seale, unto Me. Herein you are in no ways to omitt upon Perrill. Given in Albany this 8th day of December, in the 1st year of Her Maj'es Reign, Annoq Dom. 1702.

Gerrit van Ness of the Citty of Albany, aged about 57 years, declared on the Holy Evangelists upon oath, that this day about three of the clock in the afternoon, he was in the Woods on Shinnechtady Road in this County of Albany, with one Jacob van Noostrant, Junr, deceased, and that the Deponent was Cutting of a pine three, likewise was the said Jacob Cutting to another Pine Three close one to an other, and that when the Three of the Deponent was falling doune, he called to said Van Noorstrant and saith, Jacob, Jacob; at which Moment the tree of the said Jacob V. Noorstrant was also falling down. And the said Jacob did runn under the tree of the Deponent just in the falling, in so much that the aforesaid tree of the Deponent strook the said Jacob V. Noorstrant to Dead by his accident, and further said not.

Gerritt Van Ness Junr, the sonn of Hend. V. Ness, of the Colony of Rensselaerswyck, in the County aforesaid, aged about one and twenty years, declared upon oath that he was Present in the falling of said two threes, and confirming the above Deposition of Gerritt van Ness his uncle.

The Plentive demands by Declaration for the behooffe of her majes. the quit rents of a Certain Patent whereof the Defendants are the Patenties, of land belonging to

the toune of Shinnectady, the quantity of 160 bushels, being 4 jaers (years) quitt, at 40 bushels per annum. Thomas Williams, attorney for Ryer Schermerhoorn and John Wemp, defendants, in there behalfe, and John Baptist for himself, informs that the said Defendants have Petitioned to his Excellency the Governour and Councill for releese in said Quitt Rent, and therefore prays that the action may be referred till an answer on said request. [Consented to.]

Upon the Petition of Gerrit Luykasse, to the Mayor's Court, March 2, 1702, praying the worshipful Commonality to sell unto your Petitioner eight foot of ground adjoining to the west of the lott of ground lately sold to Mr. Peter Van Brugh, and in length thirty foot, or as the said lott of ground if not hindered by the Citty's Stockadoes, wherefore your Petitioner is willing to pay a reasonable price, &c.

Upon the above Petition the Commonality appointed Mr. Joh's Schuyler, Johan's Mingael, ald'n; Jacob Turk, (15) Ruth Melgertse, assistance, to make a vew if so much grounde can be conveniently spared.

Among the Aldermen, of Albany, chosen on the 14th of October, 1703, were, for the second Ward, (50) William Jacobse, Assessor; for the third Ward, (15) Ruth Melgertse, Assistant; (51) Harpert Jacobse, Assessor.

At a meeting held on the 9th of November, of said year, it was resolved by the Commonality that (15) Ruth Melgertse (Van Deusen), assistant, doe agree with some fitt persones and see them make batteries and close up the vacancies of the Cittyes Stockadoes, with all speed, at the Cittyes charge, wherefore the said (15) Ruth Melgertse as overseer is allowed 3s. per day.

Owing to complaints made to the Council, on May 9, 1704, it was ordered that an Address be made to his Excellency, for the purpose therein set forth.

To His Excellency Edward Viscount Cornbury, Cap^t General and Commander in Cheeffe of the Province of New York, and Territories depending therein in America.

The humble Adres of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonality of the City of Albany in Behalfe of themselves and other the Inhabitants of this City, humbly sheweth :

That the Inhabitants of this City, upon the Creditt of your Excellency's Order to the officers of this garrison, at your departure last from this City, directing them to give the Souldiers Creditt for necessary Provisions, in pursuance of which direction the said officers have past their notes to be paid out of the first pay that should Come to this Garrison, and where severall other of the Inhabitants out of a just regard to the service of her Majesty have Credited the Souldiers with severall Necessarys and Provisions, to support them under difficulty of a severe and tedious winter, so that indeed the best part of the money in arreare to the Souldyers is from them become due to the Inhabitants. And the Inhabitants of this City, not the Souldiers, the present sufferers, who for want of the same in a general Circulation, find extream Difficultys even in paying their very Taxes. Nor can we omit acquainting your Excellencys that Capt. Weems, at his arrivall, bringing with him a month's pay for the two companys, upon the people carrying in their notes, utterly refused to deduct any part of the money from the men, affirming that he could not do it out of so small a payment. And a further Danger seems to attend us. In report of the pay behind, severall of the Souldiers so indebted being deserted, and by experience wee have found that dead men and deserters are generally in their officer's debt. So that wee humbly hope from you Excellencys goodness such orders and instructions to the Commanding officers of each Company as may be

for the ease and security of the Inhabitants of this City forcing us to give your Excellency this trouble, by their reiterated complaints to us.

The Mayor proposed the building of a Market House within the City, and the same was forthwith ordered to be erected. Two small pieces of ground were ordered sold at the meeting of the Mayor's Court held May 30, 1704, at which (15) Ruth Melgertse (Van Deusen), assistant, was present.

On the 14th of October, 1704, (15) Ruth Melgertse was chosen Assistant, and (51) Harpert Jacobse, Assessor, both from the Third Ward.

At a conference, held at Albany, in the month of June, 1699, with the Iroquois, a bill of expenses was rendered by Robert Livingston, the clerk of the city, to the government, for articles furnished the sachems on the 13th and 14th of June.

To (15) Rut Melgertse, for 79½ lbs Tobacco for

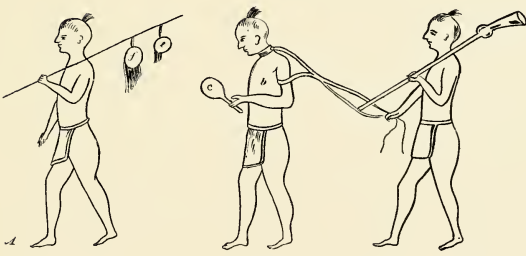
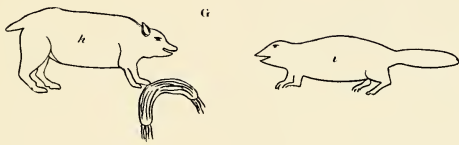
(15) Rut. Melgertse (Van Deusen) was active in the municipal affairs of the City of Albany. He was an Alderman from the Third Ward; and took the Oath of office the 14th of Oct., 1704. (51) Harpert Jacobse (Van Deusen) on the same day was sworn in as Assessor; his place of residence was the "Third Warde" of the City.

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Att a Common Councill held in y^e Citty Hall of Albany y^e 5th of ap^l, 1705. Present John Schuyler, Mayor; David Schuyler, John Roseboom, John Cuyler, John Mingael, ald^m; Hend outhout, frans winne, (15) Ruth van deuse, gerrit Roseboom, Abraham Cuyler, assistance.

Mr John Collins desyrs y^t y^e Lott of gronde between Juriaen van hoeses house & lott & y^e house & lott of Jonathan Broadhorst may be sold to him being willing to pay whats Reasonable for y^e same y^e Commonality are Informed y^t y^e same ground is Patented by John Apeell & John Casperse are therefore of opinion that word be sent to y^e s^d Appeel to Appear hear y^e 24 Instant so that they may make further Inquire in y^e matter. The Commonality (looking ever to internal protection and external defense) thought Requisite to Issue out y^e following Proclamation. That no person or Persons whatsoever shall adresse themselves to any Indian or Indians nor speak to them off or Concerning Trade nor shall Entice them without y^e Citty walls nor in y^e County by signs or otherwise howsoever to come & trade with themselves or any other persons upon pain and penalty of paying for each such offense so Committed y^e summe of thirty six shillings one forth for y^e Behoffe of y^e May^r ald. & Commonality & 3: forths for ye sherriffe who is to sue for y^e same with 3 times Twenty-four hours after such offense is Committed (certain houses were set aside outside of the city walls in which to display goods and conduct traffic with the Five Nations)

At a Mayors Court held at the City Hall in Albany, Aug 14. 1705. John Collins attorney for Pl John Gilbert demurs to the answer of the Defendant Evert Wendell Junr. upon the ground that the Defts Plea is not good in law being double, and a plea as but one entire act in law, and there cannot be any Issue joynd where that matter is aleadged in y^e plea, which is not by law ful prove made question before this Court, and that y^e writeing here in Court is as much a

declaration as a plea — (and much more of the same sort of legal phraseology equally comprehensive). The Court taking y^e s^d Plea (sic) into Consideration doe allow y^e same to be good. The Jury being caled vizt Coenraet ten Eyk, Thomas Williams, William Groesbeck, Johannis Groesbeck, Claes Rynier Myndertse, Abraham Kip, Barent Bratt, Johans Beekman, hendk ten Eyk, Daniel Bratt (51) Harpert Jacobse (Van Deusen), (15) Ruth (Rut) Van deuse, was duly sworn, and found for the defendant.

At a meeting of the Council held on the 7th day of Sept, 1705, at which were present Johannis Schuyler, Mayor; Evert Banker, Hendk Hansen, Johannis Roseboom, David Schuyler, Johannis Mingael, aldm; Gerrit Roseboom, Abraham Cuyler, Frans winne, (15) Ruth Melgertse, (Van Deusen), assistants.

The Request of Robt, Livingston Junr. whereby he desyres that a Certain peece of ground (which formerly was part of a lane or highway seituat, Lyeing to ye West of his pasture ground) may be sold to him, being Read the Common Councill do take the same into Consideration and Referr y^e same to their further Consideration in y^e mean time it is ordered that warning be given to Isaac Casperse to appear before y^e Common Councill on y^e 15 Instant at 4 a clock. Whereas the Mayor of this Citty doth Inform this Councill that severall Creditors of this Citty for Daly services done doe almost Every day adresse themselves to him for payment and since there is no Cash in the Treasurers hands whereby the said Creditors can be satisfied doth therefore desyre that y^e Common Councill will consider and take some method to Raise a found for to Defray the arrears of the said Citty Charge; In Consideration whereof the Common Councill have concluded that y^e summe of forty pounds be layd assessed & leveyd on y^e Inhabitants & sojourners within this Citty & order that a warrant be issued to y^e assessors of y^e said Citty to make an Estimate of y^e s^d Estates of y^e said

Citty & to make Return thereof unto Mr. Mayor on or before y^e 13th Instant at four a Clock in y^e afternoon und there hands and seales.

At a meeting of the Council held on the 15th day of Sept. 1705, at which (15) Ruth Melgertse (Van Deusen) was present and participated therein. It was Resolved that Publick notice by a billet to be sett up at y^e Church Requiringe all Persons that have any acct with the Citty that they give in there s^d accounts to Anthony Bratt, Treasurer on or before the 29th Instant To y^e End that y^e s^d accounts allowable be vizited & audited by Mr. Hendk Hansen, Mr. Johs Roseboom, Mr. Evert Banker, (15) Ruth Melgertse, Abraham Cuyler, & Dirk Vanderheyden on or before y^e third of october next. Pursuant to the Resolution of the 7th Instant the assessors have delivered in there Estimate amounting together £2393 which y^e Common Councill doe approve off, &c.

Evert Janse appeared before the Council, April 13, 1706, and desyres ye Commonality will be pleased to make sale of a small peece of ground scituat on y^e front of his dwelling house in y^e Brewer street.

It is resolved that a committee be appointed to vew y^e Said Ground & if they see convenient to make sale of y^e same to y^e s^d Evert Jause to y^e best advantage of y^s Citty and accordingly is appointed Mr Hendk Hansen Mr Johannis Cuyler, & Mr Johs Mingael Johs Roseboom aldm, Johs D. Wendelaer, (15) Ruth Melgertse, & Gerrit Roseboom assistance or any four of y^m to manage that matter as aforesaid which said Committee are also to vew y^e ground wherefore Evert Wendel Junr, petitions scituat to y^e West of his house & to make Report thereof whether y^e same can be conveniently disposed of or not and also to make Rules Relating y^e Market. (The Committee found the number of feet of vacant ground and appraised the value thereof, and recommended that the matter be referred to a Committee

with power.) Pursuant to Resolution the said Committee ordained the following fee for y^e Clarke of y^e market — which they appoint to be held on Saturday weekly and order that for all Cattle killed for the market, for Each head Nine pence for Every Hogg or shoat brought or Cutt out for saile in y^e market house three-pence and for Every Sheep Calf or Lamb, one penny half-penny.

At a meeting of the Council held on the 7th of May, 1706 at which (15) Ruth Melgertse was present, assistant. (In accordance with the Regulations prescribed by the Committee appointed therefor, a Proclamation was issued, petitions heard and referred, and the late sheriff was ordered to turn over funds in his hands to the present sheriff.)

(15) Ruth Melgertse was present at the Council meeting held May 19, 1706, at which it was decided to send a messenger to the Mayor to take means for repairs for y^e Defense thereof (City) agst any Insults of y^e french our Enemies. As a member of the Council on the 26th of July, 1706 he urged the passage of a Proclamation relating to the Indian Trade, the last paragraph of which is as follows: That no person or persons shall or may entertain any Indian or Indians squae or squaes (the mohogs and River Indians Excepted) into their houses after y^e Evening Bell Ringing upon penalty of forfeiting as a fine y^e summe of six shillings for y^e behoffe of such person as shall sue for y^e same. That this Proclamation doe Remain in force until y^e 14th of october next ensueing and no longer god save y^e queen.

A Proclamation was also issued on the 30th of July, 1706, under the hands of the same Common Council forbiding any person — within y^e Citty or County to give Credit on or take pand upon any account whatsoever from any Indian etc., for Liquor or any thing Else it being the cloathes on their body or their usable arms & ammunition upon complaint thereof made to any justice, etc., shall return the cloths — etc., and forfeit the summe of six shills

besides. In the case of absence of any member of the Council he shall forfeit six shillings to be levied by distress of goods and chattels.

On Dec. 7, 1706, The Council resolved to appoint the following persons as fyremasters for y^e Ensueing year until the 19th of October next. William Hogan, Anthony Coster (50) William Jacobse (Van Deusen), Johs Claes, Jan Evertse, & Jacobus Schuyler, who are to vew the Chimneys, where fyres kept within the City and oyr convenient places once in each 14 nights and where they find chimneys extraordinary fould to fine y^e owner in y^e summe of three shillings —

The Council ordained on June 19, 1708, that Hendk outhout ye sworne Surveyor of this Citty Bee authorized together with Barent Sanders and Hend: Ten Eyk, by whose directions the Inhabitants of the Pearl St. within from the house of Mr. Robt Livingston & y^e house of Catherine Vander Poel To y^e houses of Mr. John Cuyler and Johs harmense each before his house or Lott are make the Regulation & in good order y^t gysbert marcelis and (51) harpert Jacobse (Van Deusen) are likewise appointed to be assistant to y^e s^d Hend outhout by whose directions y^e Inhabts of y^e small St. y^t goes down in ye Citty from gysbt marselis and abraham Kipp to the house of John D. Wandlaer are Likewise to make Each y^e same Regular and in good order before his own house or Lott before the first of Aug^t next Ensueing.

(51) Harpert Jacobse (van Deusen), of the 2d Ward, was elected on the 29th of Sept, Alderman, and assumed the duties of office on the 14th of Oct, 1708.

At a meeting of the Council held at the city Hall on the 2d day of Dec., 1708, of which (51) Harpert Jacobse van Deusen was a member and present, it was resolved to appoint Firemasters: and that all persons who have farmed plantations at Sachkook shall be warned to appear before them.

There is a deed written in the Dutch or Holland language, of the date of 1711, from Herman Knickerbacker to Cornelius Knickerbacker. It appears to be of land occupied by (20) Van Deusen, and the house of Van Deusen was a short distance east of Geo. T. Belding. It was about 1720 that (20) Van Deusen, Knickerbacker and Dutcher purchased land in Salisbury of the Indians, supposing, as has been said, that their purchases were within the province of New York. ("The Early History of Amenia.")

The following took the Oath of Allegiance and subscribed to the Test and Association, Jan. 4, 1699: (7) Abraham Van Deusen; (50) William Jacobse; (51) Harpert Jacobse, for the City of Albany.

Cornelia Van Buren, wife of Robert Van Deussen, died before 1717. He remarried, Aug. 21, 1718, Geertruy (Gertrude) Van Benthuisen. No children recorded.

Robert Matthewse Van Deussen was a resident of Claverack, Col. Co., N. Y., in 1720; his brother, Jan, m. Marritje, the sister of Cornelia Van Buren, who was the wife of Robert.

In the will of Marten Cornelise Van Buren of Rensselaerwyck Colony, registered April 10, 1710, he devised his property to his daughter, Cornelia Martense, wife of Robert Van Deussen.

On Dec. 5, 1737, (165) Johannes Van Deusen and Johannes Vanderpoel petitioned for a license to purchase a tract of land on the south side of the patented lands of Jeremiah Van Rensselaer (commonly called the Patron's Patent), and is on both sides of the Kinderhook Creek, containing by estimation about 1000 acres of woodland, also another tract lying at a place called by the Indians Petann Hook, being to the north of the patented lands of the township of Kinderhook, and containing by estimation 1500 acres.

And about one month later, viz.: on Jan. 9, 1738, (165) Johannes Van Deusen and Johannes Vanderpoel obtained from the Indians a deed of the said last above described tract of 1500 acres situated south of the patented lands of Jeremiah Van Rensselaer.

On Aug. 22, 1738, the petition of (165) Johannes Van Deusen and Johannes Vanderpoel is again presented, praying a patent for 2500 acres of land on the south side of Jeremiah Van Rensselaer's patent.

The Mawighanunk Patent was issued Aug. 4, 1743, to (165) Johannes Van Deusen, Barent Vaasburgh and others for a tract lying northeast of Kinderhook, about 15 miles from the Hudson River, and lying on Kinderhook Creek, being part of a tract called by the Indians Mawighanunk, containing forty-three hundred and eighty acres.

Sept. 19, 1760. (170) Robert Van Deusen, son of Johannes Van Deusen, one of the original claimants, and Johannes Vanderpoel, petitioned, praying the grant of a warrant to the surveyor general to survey and run out a certain parcel of land at a place called by the Indians Petaan Hook, being on the east of the lands patented to Derick Wessels and Gerrit Teunisse, and to the north of the patented lands of the township of Kinderhook and to the south of the lands of Jeremiah Van Rensselaer, commonly called the Patroon's Patent, containing about 1500 acres of land.

On June 17, 1761, a warrant was granted to Cadwallader Colden and Alex'r Colden, to survey for Johannes Vanderpoel and (170) Robert Van Deusen two certain tracts of land containing together 2500 acres, the first of which, containing 1000 acres, was purchased by a license obtained on a petition, presented by (165) Johannes Van Deusen, father of said (170) Robert Van Deusen, and Johannes Vanderpoel, to the Honble. Geo. Clarke, lieutenant governor; said tract lies in the County of Albany, on the south side of the patented lands of Jeremiah Van Rensselaer (now called the Patroon's Patent), and on the north side of a patent granted to Burgher Huyck, John Van Alstyn and others, and is on both sides of Kinderhook Creek; and the other tract of 15,000 acres, lies at a place called Petamis Hook, being to the east of lands patented to Derick Wessels and Gerrit Teunisse, and on the north of the patented lands of the township of Kinderhook, and on the south of the line of the said Jeremiah Van Rensselaer (Westenhook Patent).

July 2, 1766. (170) Robert Van Deusen, Johannes Vanderpoel, Peter Vosburgh, and Hendrick Remsen, petition for a grant of lands on the west side of Kinderhook Creek, and on the south side of the manor of Rensselaerwyck, containing 1955 acres; and of two small islands in Hudson's River, west of Hutton Hook, praying that they be heard in

council against passing a grant to Lewis P. Williams for said lands.

On Sept. 1, 1761, John Van Rensselaer petitioned the magistrates Court praying that proceedings upon the petition of Miss Colden and others, Solomon Bebee and his associates, Johannes Vanderpoel and (170) Robert Van Deusen, for lands within that part of the manor of Rensselaerwyck called Claverack, may be stayed, and the hearing of the caveat deferred for three months.

Feb. 8, 1771. (170) Robert Van Deusen, Peter Van Ness, Peter Vosburgh, and Hendrick Remsen petitioned for a grant of 1955 acres of land on or near Kinderhook Creek, and south of the manor of Rensselaerwyck.

On Sept. 29, 1774, (170) Robert Van Deusen, Henry Remsen, Peter Vosburgh, Johannes Van der Poel, petitioned the council praying a grant of their Indian purchase at Petanhook, north of the township of Kinderhook, on the east side of Hudson's River, and that the prayer of the claimants of Westenhook Patent may not be granted.

Jacobus McNeal of the District of Kinderhook, and County of Albany, weaver, being duly sworn deposeseth and saith: in the two years last past he has often worked in the house of Andreis Kittle, whom this Deponent understands has lately gone over to the enemy. That he has frequently heard the said Andreis Kittle in discourse with Catharine, his wife, upon public matters and found that said Kittle was unfriendly to the Americans in defense of their liberties, but that the said Catharine on the contrary always has evinced the most steady attachment to this country. That their difference in sentiments upon this head was often the occasion of dispute between them and further saith not.

havior of her Husband. That She appeared to this deponent well attached to the liberties of America.

(203) Johannes Van Deusen took the oath of allegiance to the State of New York, June 10, 1777, before Pr. Van Zandt, Major, and therein agreed "in all things to do his duty as a good and faithful subject of the said State."

At the time of the border riots in 1755, (203) Johannes Van Deusen was living on leased land in the town of Taghkanic.

His father, (169) Robert, was a resident of the town of Ancram and also held a life-long lease from Robert Livingston.

Owing to frequent disturbances in the border towns there issued a proclamation under the hand and seal of the Hon. George Clinton, Capt. Gen. and Govr. in Chief of the Province of New York and Territories thereon, depending in America, Vice-Admiral of the same and Admiral of the White Squadron of his Majesty's fleet, to arrest rioters in the Manor of Livingston.

Whereas several encroachments have lately been made by the Inhabitants of the Provinces of Massachusetts Bay and in New Hampshire, upon the Lands and Possessions of divers of his Majesty's subjects, holding the same by Virtue of letters Patent under the great Seal of this Province, on pretense that the said Lands are included within the said two other Provinces.

And Whereas it appears that some person or persons pretending to be officers of the government of the Massachusetts-Bay, came into the Manor of Livingston in this Province on or about the nineteenth of this Instant, and with

the aid and assistance of Josiah Loomis, William Webb, John Hallenbeck son of Michael Hallenbeck, Joseph Arcourt, Jonathan Younglove, and David Picksley, and divers other Persons whose names are not known, in a riotous manner and with force entered the House of (169) Robert Vanduersen in the said Manor of Livingston, and by force took, bound and carried away the said Robert Vanduersen and his Son (203) Johannis, out of the said Manor of Livingston, on order to confine them in some Goal of the said government of Massachusetts-Bay, pretending that they acted under a Warrant or Authority from that Government for a Trespass committed by the said Robert Vanduersen and his Son Johannis, on Lands lying within the said Manor and Although its entrance with the said Manor lies within this Province, and was granted under the Great Seal of the same and by virtue thereof has been long in the quiet and peaceable Possession of Robert Livingston, Junior, Esquire, and his Ancestors, and of Persons claiming under them.

I have therefore thought fit by and with the advise of his Majesty's Council of this Province, to issue this Proclamation, hereby in his Majesty's Name strictly charging and Commanding the Sheriffs of the counties of Albany and Dutchess or either of them and the Constable and all other officers in the said Counties jointly or severally, forthwith to apprehend and take all and every the persons here in before named, and concerned in the Riot aforesaid, and all and every such other person or persons as may appear to have been in ways aiding, abetting or assisting therein, and they and every of them to commit to the Goals of the said Counties of Albany and Dutchess or either of them, there to be kept in safe Custody, until delivered by due course of Law :

And for preventing the like Riotous proceedings for a future, as much as may be, The said Sheriffs and other officers, are hereby in like manner, also strictly charged and Commanded to apprehend and take all persons, who shall

hereafter under color or pretence of Title or Authority from the said Government of the Massachusetts Bay, or New Hampshire, enter upon and take Possession of any Lands granted under the Great Seal of this Province, and they also to commit to Goal as aforesaid, there to be kept in safe Custody until delivered as aforesaid. And if the whole power of the said Counties or either of them be necessary for the better putting the same in execution, then to Summon the aid of the same accordingly. And all his majesty's subjects within the said Counties are hereby required to give due assistance to the said sheriff and other officers, when Summoned for the purposes aforesaid, for the several Penalties the Law can inflict, for their neglect or disobedience herein.

In a letter of Robert Van Deusen's to Robert Livingston, he writes of the dispossessing of his son Johannes and his family by inhabitants of Massachusetts Bay, as follows:

HON. SIR: This Eauening there Caimé Eleauen or twelve stranj men from New England and haue dispossessed my son Johonas and Turnd the family out Dores and Euerything that he Hass they took and put outside of the fence and will not Allow them to be put in again and they say they will kill one of the Creaters to-morrow morning for Damage or trespass. These men I nor my son Do not know one of them So Sir no better News from Your most Humbl Seruant

In a letter of Peter Livingston's to his father concerning the boundary troubles, dated at the Manor Livingston the 31st day of Oct., 1755, he writes as follows:

Yesterday I went with Mr. Decker, our Overseer, according to your Order, to Tackkaneek to the House of John Van Deusen & there I found him turned out of his house with all his family & Benjamin Franckland & his Son with 6 men more in it, when I came to the door with Decker & Robert Van Deusen old Franckland ordered the men to Kock their Guns, I told them I did not come to fight with them but to talk with them, and ask them By what order or Authority they turned the man out of his house they say'd by orders of the Court of Boston, & that they would not go out of the house till they were forced out by the Barel's of Musquets or till Governor Shirly sent an order for them to go. They likewise told them that the gentleman that signed their orders was Collo. Partridge, and Collo. Dwight &c. I remains yours Dutifull son

PETER LIVINGSTON.

Derick Spoor told me that the Chef man was Benjamin Frankland he likewise told me that 60 famileeses was going to settle their.

Mr. Livingston, under date of 9th Nov., 1755, at Albany, writes to his Excellency Gov. Hardy concerning, a "company of New England men of the Massachusetts Bay to the number of 50 to 75 come last week to Taghkanic in my Manor, a place by estimation about 16 miles East of Hudson's River, that they kept a Garrison at the House of Michial Hallenbeck, one of my Tenants on a leese for life and in the House of Johannes Van Deusen another of my tenants, who they had dispossessed and turned out with all his family the week before, that they were to begin on Fryday last, to run lines to lay out a Township and lay it

into Lotts & settle it as fast as they could" to the end that "a Speedy Stop" may be put to those riotous Proceedings. Again Mr. Livingston writes from the Manor Livingston, date of Nov. 23, 1755, to his Excellency, Gov. Hardy, explaining his reasons for detaining one Joseph Pain in Albany Goal in reprisal for the unjust and violent procedure taken by the Deputy Sheriff of Massachusetts in dispossessing Robert Van Deusen and his son Johannes, two tenants of his out of their house and who were tied upon horses and carried away and committed to Springfield Goal where he was obliged to "git suritoes" to prevent their Laying in a Goal, and who were afterwards adjudged in the Court of Springfield to pay 38 odd lbs. lawful money for supposed trespass and 14 lbs. of said money for court charges, which sums according to Mr. Livingston had already been paid by him to the utmost farthing. He therefore declines to order the Sheriff of Albany County to "sett Pain at Liberty" without having satisfaction made him.

Affidavits of Peter Livingston and others concerning the seizure of tenants from part of Livingston Manor, situated in Ancram.

City & County of Albany, ss:

On the 21th day of November 1755 Mr Peter Livingston Swart Timothy Connor Jacob Decker & James Elliott appeared before me Direk: W. Ten Broeck Esqr one of his Majesties Justice of the Peace for the City & County of Albany and Made Oath on the Holy Evengelist of Almighty God That they on the 20 day of this Instant went to Taghkanick to the House lately in the Possession of Johannis Van Deusen son of Robert Van Deusen with an order from his Excellency Governor Shirly to Benj. Franklin who lately desposed the said Johannis Van Deusen and Turned him and his family out of doors and when the deponants came to the door there appeared 4 men at the door with

their guns cock'd in their hands they told the deponants to Stand off and presented their Guns and the deponants told they that they were come Peaceable; his son Benjamin Frankland said his name was Franklin the Deponants asked him whether his Father was gone he said to Sheffield and that he kept the Possession till his Father Came home and then Timothy Connor told him that he had an order from his Excellency Governor Shirly To his Father and that as he had said he kept the possession in his fathers absence he would Deliver it to him which he did and young Franklin Read it. Timothy Connor asked him if he would accept of that order and Surrender up the Possession to Johannis Van Deusen he said he would not till his father came home then he might do as he pleased but he was there he would not Deliver it up. The Deponants Farther Deposeth that Timothy Connor Reasoned with him and told them their Danger and that he could See by the Order that they could not Expect any countenance from Governor Shirly or the Boston Court he made Answer that they had Bought the Lands and Paid for them from the Com. from Massachusetts and that the Lands did not belong to Mr. Livingston nor the Government of New York he further said that Governor Shirly was no longer Governor of the Massachusetts Bay but a Collonel in the Armeiy and that Spencer Phip was Governor now and that Governor Shirly had nothing to do in Boston while he was out of it so the Deponants left the house and about an hour after heard Several Guns fired at the house where Young Frankland was and after that Several Huzzas and Farther the Deponants saith not.

Jan Van Deusen, Jr., was a member of the Foot Company of Militia of Hurley "under the command of Captain Cornelis Winecoop, Ulster County Militia, 1738."

Captain Jan Van Deusen of Hurley was elected a deputy to the Provincial Congress from Ulster County, from Hurley. At a meeting of the committees of the several towns and precincts in the County of Ulster, he was elected and appointed to meet in a provincial congress at the City of New York on the 22d day of May or at such other time and place as may be agreed on. This meeting was held at New Paltz, at the house of Mrs. Ann Du Bois, in the county aforesaid, on the 11th day of May, 1775.

Saturday Morning, Septbr 28th 1776. Proceedings of the Provincial Congress. The Convention were informed that Colo. Humphreys of Dutchess County who is attending alleges that it is impracticable for him to raise the proportion of the last levies, ordered to be detached from the Militia of this County, which ought to be detached from his Regiment. Colo. Humphreys called in says, That he understands that the Order for raising men is that they be raised voluntarily—but if otherwise 'tis his opinion that

there are so many disaffected that they can not be drafted. . . . That Cap't (235) Johs Van Duersen says his whole [Company] except his Lieutenant and himself are Tories.

Capt. (235) John Van Deusen, Jr., was elected Sept 20. Commissioned Oct., 1775. Pawling's Regt.—Reappointed Quartermaster Feb. 19, 1778, for the 1st or Northern Regt. of Ulster Co. Oct. 19, 1779. Appointed Adjutant, vice Abraham A. Hasbrouck, resigned—Lieut. of Levies April 27, 1781. Was paymaster in Pawling's Regt. in 1780–1781.

Marrytje, his wife, was daughter of Gerrit Reyertse and Annetje Janse. She was buried March 9, 1750.

The will of Gerrit Reyertse, yeoman, was proved Feb. 15, 1693. Annetje Reyertse, his wife, left a will, proved May 8, 1712, in which she names Marrytje, wife of Harpert Van Deusen.

Harpert Jacobse Van Deusen and William Claesen Groesbeck were deacons of the Ref. Prot. Dutch Church, Albany, 1701. They contributed to the magistrates of Albany, 120 guilders for the support of Jacob de Wilde, Jonge. Domine Lydius's expenses from Amsterdam were paid in full, 503:9; and the passage of Dom. Freeman, 560 g. The receipts were 3481 g., and the disbursements 2880:2.

In 1700, Johannes Cuyler and Evert Bancker were deacons of the Church at Albany. The collections taken up in the church on the first Sunday in January amounted to 218 g. 14 s. John Kidnie paid 54 g. for half a year's rent of the east end of the poor house, which seems to have been vacant by the decrease in the number of the poor; the old names having all disappeared from the list. It appears that Hendrick Roseboom received 400 g. from the city and county besides his salary from the church; and he was voted 50 guilders extra pay for services as *voorlezer* during the time the church was without a pastor before the arrival of Dom. Uncella, which seems to have been on the 16th of April, 1699. On the 15th of February, Ryseck, widow of Gerrit Swart, the last of the church poor, died, and was buried on the 17th, the *onkosten* of which was as follows: 3 dry boards for the coffin, 7:10; $\frac{3}{4}$ lb. nails, 1:10; making the coffin, 249.; cartage, 103.; a half vat and an anker of good beer, 27 g.; 1 gal. rum, 21 g.; 6 gall. Madeira for women and men, 84 g.; Sugar and cruyery, 5 g.; 150 sugar cakes,

15 g.; tobacco and pipes, 4:10; Hendrick Roseboom, *dood-graver*, 30 g.; use of the pall, 12 g.; total, 232 g. A claim of Roseboom of 12 g. for inviting to the funeral (*prelendeerde voor't aenspreken buyten d' stad*) was paid; but it was regarded as an extortionate charge, and the consistory ordered that the *doodgraver* should thereafter have from the deacons 30 guilders and no more, for like services. Mary, wife of Jacob Lookermans, was paid 6 g. for assistance (*handry kingh*) at the burial, and Marritje, widow of Harme Lievertse, who had long received a monthly stipend for nursing and board, was paid the same as for a full month, as was the custom, 36 g. A statement of the Ryseck Swart during four years is given, amounting to 2229 g. 10 s., and she is credited with effects, consisting of silver ware, jewelry, etc., and a lot on the plain (*tuynerffop de plyn*) which were appraised by the patroon and Jacob Turck at 644 g. 10 s., which in seawant was 1585 g. On the 20th of July Dom. Johannes Lydius and Dom. Bernardus Freerman arrived (the latter the second pastor at Schenectady). On Sunday the 21st they both assisted in the services (*elck eens gepredikt*), and on the following Sunday Dom. Lydius preached his introductory sermon. New improvements were made on the domine's house, and a new turned bedstead was purchased for Dom. Lydius at 40 g. A payment of 160 g. was made by Nanningh and Frederick Harmense towards their saw mill on the Bevers kil. A payment of 506 g. was made upon the expenses of Dom. Lydius from Antwerp. The receipts were nearly 4000 guilders, and although there were many extraordinary expenses, there remained 853:12 in the treasury. The signatures to this year's business are those of

The church, however, was not erected until several years later.

In 1707, (51) Harpert Jacobse (Van Deusen) and Robert Livingston were church masters. Jan Huybertse died in February. He was one of the nooddruftige, and had received various articles of necessity. The following items are given under date of 25th Feb. To Hendrick Oothout for making the coffin, 25:10; $\frac{1}{2}$ vat of good beer, 18 g.; to David Schuyler for 3 gallons of wine, 30 g.; $1\frac{1}{2}$ gall. rum, 18 g.; Johannes Lansingh for pipes, 3 g.; tobacco, 5 g.; for inviting to the funeral, digging the grave and tolling the bell (aenspreken graftmaken, en klock luyden) 36 g.; total, 235:10. Peter Bronk and Anthony Bogardus were paid 105:15 for making the balcony to the domine's house. Oct. 23, Geertie, wife of Jan Thoorn, was buried at the expense of the church masters. Jacob Staats was paid 42 g. for half a year's rent of his small tenement, occupied by the widow of Patrick Macgregory. The domine was paid 473 g. on account of his salary. Outlays continued to be made on the domine's house. The name of Shivolet Bogardus is mentioned. The treasury gained more than 500 guilders during that year.

Jacobus (James) Van Deusen owned a farm about one mile north of Johnstown, Col. Co., N. Y., on the road leading to Hudson, and another farm at West Taghkanic. The latter farm he gave to his son Nicholas. The Johnstown farm he gave to his son Robert (later known as Robert I),

which farm was afterwards owned by Henry Du Bois (in 1894 by Austin Hodskins).

James Van Deusen and his wife are buried on this farm, near the old hay barn. A Bible record owned by Mrs. Mary E. Briggs-Kells of Sheffield, Mass., gives the date of his death as June 7, 1820.

Elizabeth Smith was a daughter of Jonas Smith and Elizabeth Smith, who came from Germany and settled at Johnstown, where they were married Nov. 19, 1723, by Rev. J. C. Treyemoet. Their children were Henry, who married Elizabeth Muller; Nicholas, who married Christina Ham; and Elizabeth, who married James Van Deusen.

James Van Deusen was a man of unusual strength and vigor and exceedingly tall. On account of his height he was called "Foyer" by the members of his family. He died very suddenly at the home of his son, Nicholas Van Deusen, on the farm at West Taghkanic, Col. Co., N. Y., his dead body being found in his bed by a family slave named Dean. The wife of James Van Deusen became blind in the latter years of her life; she died at the home of her son Robert near Johnstown.

Tobias Van Deusen was born in 1735, and was living at Claverack when he married; his wife, Cornelia Van Deusen, was born at Claverack and was residing at Livingston at time of marriage.

Tobias Van Deusen was a member of the 8th Regiment, Col. Robert Van Rensselaer, and also a member of the 8th Regiment (land bounty rights). He was a resident of Hudson at the time of his death. He died about 1817. In his will he names his sons, Mattheus, Cornelis, and Robert, and the children of his son Robert. Also his grandchildren, Maria and Cornelia, children of his daughter Ariantje (Anna) Bingham.

Cornelia Van Deusen, his wife, died July 21, 1801, aged 66 years. Her daughter, Anna, who married John Bingham of New York, died July 5, 1787, aged 24 years. Both are buried in the old Van Deusen burial lot near "Spook Rock" in the town of Claverack, N. Y.

Also in the Dutchess County militia (land bounty rights), Major Brinton Pain (5th Regiment). On Dec. 11, 1772, he petitioned for 500 acres of land on the west side of Kinderhook Creek, adjoining to the Manor of Rensselaerwyck.

Tobias Van Deusen m. 2d, Linje Van Deusen, daughter of (193) Robert Van Deusen and Marytje Ostrander, Feb. 15, 1789, at Claverack (banns); no children recorded. Tobias Van Deusen died Oct. 27, 1802, aged 53 years. Hannah Spoor, his first wife, died April 18, 1788, aged 41 years; they are buried opposite "Spook Rock," near the village of Claverack, in the old Van Deusen burial lot.

Linje Van Deusen, his second wife, died Dec. 8, 1799, aged 36 years, and is buried in the same place.

In the will of Tobias Van Deusen, registered in the office

of the Surrogate at Hudson, he names his sons, Robert, John, Abraham, Dirk, and James, and his wife Linje. He also mentions his daughters, Christina and Maria, and appoints his sons James and Abraham executors.

Dr. Porter, in his address at the centennial celebration of the Claverack (Dutch) Church in 1867, of which he was then pastor, says: "The Van Deusen family is among the oldest, tracing its beginnings back to an ancestor who built the brick house near the creek, on the south shoulder of Beighraft's mountain." This is said to be one of the four earliest houses in the town. The name appears often in the town records. At the first town meeting, held June 6, 1837, (282) John T. Van Deusen was chosen Commissioner of Highways; (286) Abraham T., Overseer of the Poor; and William, Commissioner of Schools. The latter was also the first Pathmaster of District No. 6. John Tobias lived east of Beighraft's Mountain, near the creek, on the farm now owned by William Brownell. Abraham Tobias lived in the neighborhood; William lived on the creek near the Stone Mills.

Nicholas Van Deusen, as well as his father James, died at the home of James Nicholas Van Deusen, his son, at West Taghkanic, which is now in the possession of the two unmarried daughters of James Nicholas Van Deusen, who also died there; thus three generations of the heads of the Van Deusen family have died at this homestead.

The house is an unpretentious two-story frame dwelling, situated on the slope overlooking the little hamlet of West Taghkanic. It contains many quaint and curious relics of bygone days, among them being an old corner cupboard which is still undespoiled of its old blue Staffordshire ware and many small pieces of "family silver" and cherished heirlooms.

One of the bedrooms contains a tall four-poster bedstead draped and valanced, a curious relic of a century ago. The headstone of Nicholas Van Deusen, in the cemetery at Johnstown, N. Y., contains the following inscription:

"Death, King of Terrors! Terrorless thou art
To him o'er whom Religion casts her shield."

Robert Nicholas Van Deusen, as a young man looking about to secure a position to better himself, furnished a man to assist his father in his store and undertook the teaching of a school in the neighborhood where he was born. He afterwards served as a clerk in the store of Forrest & Van Deusen at Johnstown.

Robert Nicholas Van Deusen entered into the flour-mill and general merchandising business with Abram F. Miller, as partner, in the town of Ancram. When Mr. Miller retired from business, Mr. Van Deusen secured the store and mill, on Punch Brook, built by Livingston in 1775, which was situate at Scotchtown near Ancram Lead Mines, then a portion of Livingston Manor. On the death of Col. Robert Livingston, this property became portion of the estate which passed to George D. Livingston, who sold to Mr. Van Deusen the life lease under which he held his property. At the first town meeting held in the town of Gallatin, April 6, 1830, he was chosen an Inspector of Schools. Afterwards, owing to the result of exposure, his health failed, which incapacitated him for business; he therefore decided to retire, and sold out his business and

devoted himself to preparing his son, Edwin Holmes, for admission to the Academy at Claverack. About 1839 he bought property at Claverack to be conveniently near the academy. When his son had finished his academic course and entered Williams College, Mr. Van Deusen removed from Claverack to Pittsfield, Mass., to give his daughter educational advantages. In the year 1849 he purchased property at Stuyvesant Landing of Hon. Benjamin F. Butler, Secretary of State under President Van Buren, and resided there until his death. Mr. Van Deusen was a man of quiet and gentle manners and beloved and trusted by all who knew him.

1710-1712, David Schuyler and Anthony Coster in office (Reformed Church, Albany), Elizabeth Janse and her two children were the principal subjects of alms. In April they paid Domine Du Bois for pastoral services and expenses, 556 guilders. Abram Kuyler was paid 141 guilders for cleaning the church. The accounts run into another year without the customary annual audit. In March Domine Vos was paid 400 guilders for services. In April £75, or 3000 guilders, was paid for a draft on Holland to pay for the call of a new domine. In October Domine Vos was paid another 400 guilders. Johannes Van Alen was paid 6 guilders for the passage of Domine Du Bois from Esopus, and Luykes Wyngaert 129 guilders for taking him back. William and Johannes Claessen received 401:10 voor het maecken van de kerek (by which it would seem that they had already begun the building of the new church, which was completed three years later). In April Samuel Beyiert and Jan Cruger were paid 1382 guilders on account of Domine Van Driessen, and in June he was paid £22:100, or 900 guilders. Abram Van der Poel paid one year's rent of water for his mill on the Bever's Kil, and Daniel Bradt 106 guilders for the use of water for his mill on the same stream (twee jaer water loop van syn molen). At the close of the year 1712, these brethren rendered their statement for three years—receipts, 15807:16; expenditures, 13029:18. The following names are attached to the audit.

Draft of Letters patent for incorporating the Reformed protestant Dutch Church in the City of Albany and making of them one body corporate and politick to them and their Successors for ever by the name of the Ministers Elders and Deacons of the reformed Protestant Dutch Church in the City of Albany the reverend Petrus van Driesen being their present minister Johannes Cuyler Johannes Rosenboom Henry Van Ranselaer & (50) William Jacobsen Van Deusen being the Present Elders Rutgert Bleecker Volkert van Veghten Myndert Rosenboom & Dirck Ten Broeck being the Present Deacons of the said Church for the free use and exercise of their religion and worship according to the Cannons rules institutions and church Government established by the National synod of Dort in Holland in the years of our Lord Christ 1618 and 1619 with such libertys and priviledges as are granted to the Minister Elders and deacons of the reformed protestant Dutch church in the City of New York or to the Minister Elders and Deacons of the Reformed Protestant Dutch Church of the town of Kingstown in Ulster County with such variacons conditions or missions as they may have found most proper and agreeable to their present circumstances. provided always that the yearly income from demesnes where they are unpaid or hereafter shall become assessed or possessed shall not Exceed the sum of three hundred pounds lawfull mony of the Colony of New York And you are by the Draft of the said Letters Patent to Grant and confirm to them and their successors and assigns forever all the tenements and heridataments whatsoever where they are now assessed and possessed for the benefit and behoof of the aforesaid minister elders and deacons of the reformed protestant Dutch church in the City of Albany their successors and assigns forever saving nevertheless the right & title of any other person or persons, body corporate and politick whatsoever to any of the aforesaid tenements and hereditaments or to any part or parts of any of them yielding and being there-

fore yearly and forever owned by our sovereign Lord In-
come his heirs and successors forever the annual rent of
one peppercorn on a feast of the annuciacon of the blest
Virgin Mary commonly called Lady day in lieu & state of
all other rents services dued duties and demands whatsoever
the particulat description and limits and boundaryes of
their present demesnes are conteind in a certain schedule
hereunto annexed and for yor so doing this shall be your
sufficient Warrant

Edwin H. Van Deusen, A.M., M.D., of Kalamazoo, Kalamazoo County, was born Aug. 29, 1828, at Livingston, Columbia County, N. Y. His father, Robert N. Van Deusen, was also a native of Livingston, and was by occupation a merchant and miller. His mother, Catherine Best, was a daughter of John Best, a farmer of Columbia County. Our subject attended the district schools in the neighborhood of his home during his boyhood, and took a preparatory course of three years at Claverack Academy, now known as the Hudson River Institute, subsequently entering Williams College, from which he graduated at the age of twenty. Three years later this college conferred upon him the degree of Master of Arts. He entered the College of Physicians and Surgeons at New York City in 1848, and

graduated therefrom two years later, and immediately accepted a position on the staff of the New York Hospital, where he remained for three years. In 1853 he received the appointment of first assistant physician at the New York State Lunatic Asylum, at Utica, which he held until 1858. By an act of the Legislature of this State in 1848, provision was made for the establishment of the Michigan Asylum for the Insane, and in 1855 Dr. Van Deusen was appointed to the position of medical superintendent thereof. The locating commissioner selected ten acres of ground in the immediate vicinity of the then village of Kalamazoo. This property was afterwards sold, and one hundred and fifty-seven acres were purchased where the institution now stands. Dr. Van Deusen frequently visited Kalamazoo during the years 1855, 1856, and 1857, and in the fall of 1858, resigning his position at the Utica Asylum, of which he was then assistant medical superintendent, removed to Kalamazoo. Up to this time the appropriations by the Legislature for asylum purposes had been insufficient to carry out the plans adopted, and in Feb., 1859, Dr. Van Deusen, with the active assistance of Dr. Foster Pratt, who then represented the district in the Lower House of the State Legislature, secured the first large appropriation, the amount being \$100,000. On plans made by Dr. Van Deusen, active building operations under his supervision were immediately commenced, continuing the work already begun, and the institution was formally opened Aug. 29, 1859, although a number of patients had been received during the two preceding months. The center building and the contiguous half of what is now the south wing of the female department were then finished; the south wing was completed in the next two years, and the north wing from six to seven years later, while what is now the male department was put in operation in 1877. Probably no better success has been met with in the history of public buildings of this character than that attained by Dr. Van Deusen in this work.

Possessed of a thorough knowledge of its requisites, a wonderful grasp of detail, a brilliant executive ability, his name up to the time of his retirement was a synonym of success in a broad field of labor, to which our most learned profession has devoted some of its most brilliant members, and in which opinions have widely differed—a field covering the whole question as to the best methods of caring for and treating the insane. He held the position of medical superintendent until Feb., 1878, when failing health and strength, produced by excessive labor, compelled his resignation. Previous to his resignation he had served as a member of the commission appointed to select the location and to superintend the construction of the Eastern Michigan Asylum for the Insane, which has since been erected at Pontiac; and in 1853 he acted on similar commissions in connection with the Northern Michigan Asylum for the Insane, since built at Traverse City. In 1881 he was appointed a member of the Michigan State Board of Corrections and Charities, which office he resigned in 1885. His health and his tastes have not permitted an active continuance of the practice of his profession, and since severing his connection as superintendent of the asylum he has lived a quiet life of literary leisure at his pleasant home in Kalamazoo. He is an active member of St. Luke's Protestant Episcopal Church, and one of its vestrymen, and was chairman of its Building Committee, and supervised its construction, the work being completed in 1855. July 22, 1858, he was united in marriage to Miss Cynthia A. Wendover, daughter of the late John Thompson Wendover, Esq., a merchant of Stuyvesant (formerly Kinderhook), on the Hudson. They have one son, Robert T., born April 26, 1859, who is married, and at present resides at Albany, N. Y. An old friend of our subject delineates his qualities as a man, a physician, and an official, in terse and expressive phrases: "He brought to the business of his life a healthy though slender physique, an active mind, well stored with the knowledge of his chosen profession, an unsullied integrity, a strong

will softened by courteous manners, and admirable executive ability. While yet a young man at Utica he soon reached, as a practitioner and writer, the front rank in his specialty. Transferred to Kalamazoo, he made the plans for both asylum buildings, superintended the details of their construction, made them models from which several Western States have drawn their designs, and established for the institution and himself a brilliant reputation for successful administration and beneficent results. After twenty years of self-sacrificing labor which nearly cost his life, he retired to well-earned repose and literary leisure with the consciousness of duty well done. His official career has not a taint of reproach. He was pure in impulse and pure in action, tender and sensitive as a woman in the presence of affliction, but cool, resolute, and brave in action. His twenty years of official life in the Michigan Asylum will be always remarkable for successful administration, and for the fruitful results of skilfully applied science. Fortunately, he yet lives to be a blessing to others, and to be blessed by the thousands who have been restored by his agency to home, to friends, to usefulness, and to reason."

John Van Deusen was early thrown upon his own resources. His first business venture was at the village of Johnstown, in the town of Livingston, where he was one of the first to engage in active trade at that point, selling his goods in an old shed. About 1800 he built a storehouse in which he followed the merchandising business for forty years. At one time he was in partnership with Forest in a general country store. The latter afterwards retired and Reed became a member of the firm, and the business was conducted in 1830 under the firm name of Van Deusen & Reed. In 1820 he owned and operated the flouring-mills known as the "Good Hope" mills, now known as the Bingham mills, and carried on an extensive business, also, in real estate. His success in life won him the nickname of "Johnny Wax."

Mr. Van Deusen was Town Clerk from 1805 to 1812; Postmaster at one time; also served as Supervisor from 1812 to 1820. In 1823 he was elected a Member of Assembly in the State Legislature. His chief amusement was horseback riding, in which he excelled. By reason of his superb horsemanship and commanding presence he was early chosen an officer in the State Militia, in the cavalry branch

of the service. He was for many years a Director in the National Hudson River Bank at Hudson. He was a man well known and respected throughout the county for strict integrity, excellent judgment, and remarkable business success. He was deeply interested in church affairs; he was a member of the Consistory, and at different times Treasurer of the church at Johnstown. In 1842 he removed to Greenport, in Columbia County, and resided on the farm lately owned and occupied by Mr. Henry A. Du Bois, where he died in 1864.

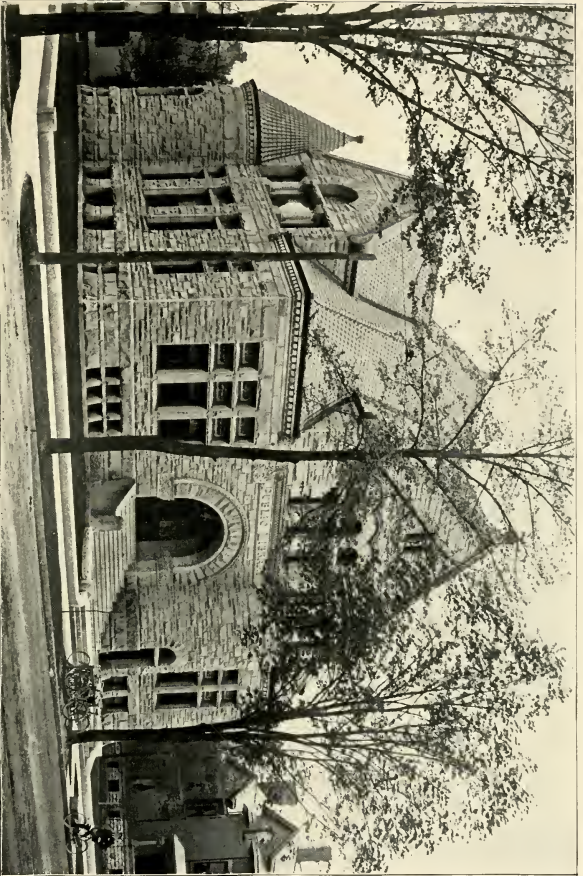

FROM an exhaustive examination of the records, we have been unable to find the least evidence that any of the children of (1) Abraham Van Deusen left a will. The following notes, however, which were obtained too late for insertion in their proper places, may be of interest.

Freeman, Marmaduke, late of the Morant, Parish of St. Thomas, Island of Jamaica, now of New York City, gent, mother, Mary Freeman, wife Eleanor, daughter, Mary, real and personal, in Jamaica. Executors, the wife, father-in-law, Jacob Swan, of New York, and Colonel John Coreleir, of Jamaica. Witnesses, John Bend, Samuel Dunscomb, (4) Matthew van Durzen (Deusen) and Johannes Degrave (De Graff).

Inventory enumerates gold rings with diamonds, gold shoe buckles, a gold chain 7 or 8 chains thick, with a gold locket flowered and marked M † F., one silver tankard, holding a gallon, two do., holding a quart each, three silver salt cellars, six silver spoons and forks, all new, 3 or 4 old silver porringers. Will dated March 18, 1726. Registered March 29, 1727.

Groesbeeck, Claes Jacobsen, of Albany City, wife Elizabeth, children, Jacob, William, Barber, wife of Gysbert Marcellis, Rebecca, wife of Dominicus van Schaak, Johannis and Stephanus, children of deceased daughter, Catrine, late wife of Jacob Teunissen (Van Vechten). Real and personal estate. The wife was named as executrix. Witnesses, (50) Willem Jacobsen (Van Deusen), Claes Vonda (Fonda), and Robert Livingston. The will is dated Jan. 3, 1706. Registered March 20, 1713.

(50) Willem Jacobsen (Van Deusen) was an alderman from the Second Ward in the City of Albany, 1711.

There is a deed, dated 1733, given by (51) Harpert Jacobsen van deuse (Deusen) to the Commonality of Albany, of a certain piece of vacant land, adjoining his residence, and bounded generally in front by the public highway, and on the right by the adjoining property owner. Said land was presumably desired and used for the benefit of the public.

The W. Commissaries assembled in consequence of the arrival of the new Minister, Dom. Godefridus Dellius, who reached here on the 2d. instant pursuant to the request and letters of this Court to the Venerable Classis of Amsterdam.

And whereas by consent and approval of this Commonality a second Domine is sent for to assist the old Dom: Schaets, it is therefore resolved to call the Congregation together to enquire of them in a friendly manner how much they will from their own Liberality and good inclination contribute to the maintenance of the said Dom. Godefridus Dellius.
